### **About St. James' Education Program**

The Education program at St. James' Episcopal Church includes programs for children, youth, and adults. The programs offered range from formal education to service to fellowship, as we feel that all three of these areas are important for spiritual formation.

Formal instruction is imperative at all stages of life, child through adult. Youth through Adults are offered many opportunities to serve before, during, and following worship. Participating in worship from a young age creates an involved Episcopalian in the years to come! Youth are also encouraged to attend monthly fellowship groups, whether at FUEL (K—5th grade) or at Diocesan Youth Events (6th—12th.) Geared for their age, these groups provide a fun, safe environment for youth to learn about God and each other.


## A Message from Rev. Dr. Mike Sowards

### "The NEED For Christian Education"

Today we live in a secular world where all references to scripture has been pretty much scrubbed from our daily lives! To make matters worse, what people know about the bible is appalling and many of the things that are attributed to the bible is false. The following are some examples of biblical illiteracy from a recent Gallop poll:

- ⇒ Fewer than ½ of all adults in the United States can name all four Gospels
- ⇒ Only 40% of adults can name more than 5 of the ten commandments
- ⇒ 82% of Americans think the quote "God helps those who help themselves" is in the bible (It is a quote from Ben Franklin)
- ⇒ A staggering number of people attributed the "Sermon on the Mount" to the evangelist Billy Graham
- ⇒ Over 70% of high school students thought that Joan of Arc was married to Noah

The problem with biblical illiteracy is also rampant among the people that are reporting our news and making commentary on religious matters. In April of 2018 the reputable Wall Street Journal ran an article where they misquoted prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu as saying "'Moses brought water from Iraq." What the prime minister actually said was that Moses "brought water from a rock," a reference to either Exodus 17 or Numbers 20. Although this could be attributed to the pronunciation of Iraq it still goes to show the relative ignorance of those covering the prime minister. The following is a disturbing example from NPR:



What are they even talking about? If you don't know that Easter is the day Christians celebrate Jesus' Resurrection, and that this is the most basic belief of the world's largest religion, then readers and listeners could justly ask what business does NPR have reporting on religion, at all.


The fact that those who influence public opinion can talk about something they know nothing about astounds me. The following is from a commentary from NBC's Chuck Todd who tweeted out this about Good Friday:

"I'm a bit hokey when it comes to 'Good Friday.' I don't mean disrespect to the religious aspect of the day, but I love the idea of reminding folks that any day can become 'good,' all it takes is a little selflessness on our own part. Works EVERY time."

Just imagine if he would have said something so inappropriate about Islam or Judaism. The reason he can get away with this is that most Christian Americans are biblically illiterate.

Although all of this is disconcerting and disheartening, the fact that Christians themselves don't read and know their sacred scriptures is disappointing. In the same Gallop poll that I referred to earlier, the researchers came to the startling conclusion that Americans revere the bible but, don't read it.

At the conclusion of the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus tells his disciples to:



How can you make disciples if you don't know what disciples believe? How can you obey the teaching of the Church if you don't know what they are?

In my over 6 years as your Rector here at St. James' I have had limited success with getting people to participate in Christian Education. Our new Christian Education Coordinator, Lauren Exley, has started to correct the fact that our children could be in Church School for years and not know the basic tenants of our faith. The curriculum that we are now using tells the biblical stories as well as emphasizing the basic components of our Anglican Heritage. All of us took a vow at our baptism to "continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers. Are we going to ignore this commitment or are we going to take steps to learn what is the apostles' teaching?

Please take inventory of your spiritual life and see what is amiss when it comes to biblical illiteracy. Take advantage of the Wednesday night adult bible studies as well as the Thursday morning Christ and Coffee offerings at 11:00 am. I am more that willing to teach more classes if the commitment is there. Parents ensure that your children attend Church School so that they will have a good foundation of our faith. Knowing more about the bible and the principles of our faith can make us better disciples in the world and allow us to bring others to Christ. That is what God has called us to do! That is what we have promised!

### Church School Classes

Classes meet Sundays from 10:00-10:30am.

Children begin in church with their families and leave with their teachers after the opening hymn. They will return in time for Communion.

Occasionally, to promote understanding of the worship service, Church School students attend the 10am Worship Service. Children sit together with their teachers and practice using the tools of worship. These special days will be called "Kids in Church" Sundays!

### Middle School (6th - 8th grade) \*

The Middle School years are about forming the basis for the adult Christian life. Youth begin connecting their faith to the world around them. Students learn Episcopal Church basics alongside their continuing study of Scripture.

### High School (9th - 12th grade) \*

High School students participate in a variety of discussions and programs. The class is designed to transition students from a follower of the church to a leader in the church. Students have the opportunity to be confirmed (a separate course) and become more integrated in to the life of the parish.

\*MS and HS students are encouraged to join a church ministry (Acolyte, Altar Guild, Music, etc.) in addition to coming to classes. Altar acolytes, crucifers, and torch bearers can participate in the processional, attend class, and continue serving as usual after returning.

## Everything you wanted to know about Curriculum

What our kids will learn (and how it will help them later in life!)

The St. James' Education Program is now on Year 3 (Cross Year) of our curriculum rotation! This curriculum is based on a free resource provided by Virginia Theological Seminary and has been modified for our use. What makes this curriculum special is that it was written by, and for, Episcopalians! The lessons themselves are constructed in a way that will introduce children and youth to the structure and theology of the Episcopal worship service.

The year is divided into four separate units, which rotate on a 3-year cycle. Each year has a different focus (Baptism, Eucharist, or Worship), ensuring that students are exposed to a wide array of topics during their time in class. You can find unit topics and lesson titles for the current year on the following page.



Keep an eye out for updates in the "Education Corner" of the weekly service bulletin. Check-in regularly with up-to-date lesson plan topics, schedules, and announcements.

More about each class... Starting in Pre-Kindergarten, children will begin learning responses common to the worship service (Thanks be to God!) and become familiar with hearing Scripture in an age appropriate way. Games, crafts, and songs help young students engage with the material. This year begins with the stories of Ruth and David, showing the trust that they had in the Lord. As the students progress through the year, they will learn how Jesus is a teacher and when we come to church, we are reminded to love others through worship! The year ends with a reminder that we can worship God in many ways, at many times, and with many songs!

Elementary students will build on the concepts learned in their Primary years and will quickly become accustomed to locating and reading Scripture for themselves. Classes begin by reciting an opening statement or prayer, followed by an opportunity for student lectors to read Scripture aloud. A time of discussion and brief activity is always concluded with prayer. This year begins with stories from the Old Testament, showing the faithfulness of the characters. After studying Jesus' teachings from the Sermon on the Mount, the Golden Rule, and the importance of all people as ministers throughout Units 2 and 3, the students will see how the church worships and serves together to share the love of God. In Unit 4, students will understand more of their own history, as they study the history of the Anglican church.

Middle School classes place emphasis on students forming a solid foundation for their future adult Christian life. Each class follows the structure of the Episcopal service, beginning with the daily Collect, followed by Scripture reading, a time of engaging, and a concluding prayer read from the *Book of Common Prayer*. This year, students will connect their study of scripture to a variety of public figures and examples of Christian living throughout history and present day. These public figures will act as a spring-board for further discussion and activity that will challenge the youth to live lives centered around Christian principles. Units 1, 2, and 3 also conclude with lessons from The Basic Series, a resource that introduces basic principles of the Episcopal Church. Unit 4 provides a unique opportunity to follow The Way of Love, a resource produced by the national Episcopal Church and promoted by Bishop Michael Curry. This series is sure to change the heart, mind, and soul for a new outlook on yourself, Christ and the world.

High School classes provide a time for our older youth to discover and debate their faith in a supportive environment. Students will have the opportunity to discuss a variety of topics, from Scripture to the "real-world". The class structure is designed to transition students into their life as an Episcopal adult.

### Wednesday Night Program—Session 1

Disciple Bible Study: Gospel of John through the Book of Revelation

*Disciple* is a program of disciplined Bible study aimed at developing strong Christian leaders. The class finished its study of the Old Testament last program year and began exploring the New Testament. We will begin this year with the Gospel of John. ### **Confirmation Class**

Open to all 10th Grade—Adult

Sundays beginning January 5th, 2020 from 9:15-9:45am (7 sessions)

All will be Confirmed or Received by Bishop Gutierrez on Wednesday, February 19th at 7:00pm.

Confirmation is an important time in a young person's life. In the Episcopal tradition, parents and grandparents make promises for the young child that are affirmed by the young adult at Confirmation. Classes are formed prior to the Bishop's yearly visit.

A young adult participates in Confirmation in their High School years. Individuals (10th Grade - Adult) can choose when it is most appropriate for them to receive Confirmation. If your child is ready for confirmation, please indicate their intent to participate on the Education Program registration form!

Please note - Confirmation Class is not a substitute for the regularly scheduled High School class from 10:00-10:30. Students will attend both classes.

If you are interested in being confirmed or received this year, please contact Fr. Mike.

Note: Adults who have been confirmed in another denomination can elect to be "received" rather than "confirmed" by the Bishop and are strongly encouraged, but not obligated, to take this course.

### Opportunities to Serve Available for all Pre-Kindergarten-Adult

Our community is strongest when everyone, including our youth, participate in worship with a servant's heart. The lessons learned early in life carry-on into the adult years. This is why we encourage our youth to be active participants in the worship service. Our hope is that each child and young adult finds an opportunity to serve.

Below, you will find several ways that youth and adults can become involved in the worship service. Youth will register on the Education Program Registration form. Interested adults can contact the coordinator directly.



Junior Choir (Pre-Kindergarten-8th Grade)

Junior Choir is for all kids who are interested in singing! The choir rehearses weekly after the 10am service. The choir presents an anthem monthly and occasionally processes and leads worship at the 10am service. Additionally, the choir performs on Christmas Eve (5:00pm service) and Easter Sunday.

### Rector's Cross (Pre-Kindergarten—5th Grade)

The child assigned to be the Rector's Cross has responsibilities during the Processional (opening hymn) and Recessional (closing hymn). At the appointed time, the child collects the smaller cross and carries it just ahead of Father Mike. This service can be completed before and after Sunday School.

### Acolyte Program (6th Grade—Adult)

The Book of Common Prayer says, "At all celebrations of the Liturgy, it is fitting that the principal celebrant, whether Bishop or Priest, be assisted by other priests, and by deacons and lay persons. Being an acolyte is doing just that—actively assisting the Priest in the worship of God. The ministry of the acolyte is to be a servant to God and God's church—the word "acolyte" does mean "one who serves." Acolyte is a general term that refers to servants of the liturgy, including crucifers, torchbearers and thurifers.

At St. James', we use 3 acolytes each at both the 8am and 10am services on Sunday. The Crucifer carries the cross and leads the procession. They also assist at the altar in preparing the table for Eucharist. Following the Crucifer are two torch bearers, who carry the candles.

We welcome anyone, 6th grade through Adult, to join this important ministry. A training will be held in the Fall for all acolytes, including current members.

Why not a mission trip? Mission trips absolutely have their place and they do serve a wonderful purpose. However, the goal of a pilgrimage is different. Many of our youth have spent a lifetime learning about their faith right here in Collegeville, PA. St. James' is their spiritual home. It is comfortable, familiar, and feels very routine. A pilgrimage at this pivotal age will challenge these young adults to become independent in their spiritual lives. Our goal is that they return ready to continue in the apostles teaching and the prayers on their own terms and of their own choice, both while at home and once they head off to college.

Who pays? Costs for Pilgrimage are split between the Pilgrimage fund (a budgeted line item that includes carried over funds from past fundraisers), money fundraised directly by the attendees this program year, and additional out-of-pocket costs.

When will the next Pilgrimage be scheduled? I love that you are thinking ahead! We are now on an official 3-year rotation for Pilgrimage! The next Pilgrimage will be scheduled for Summer 2023 and at that point, all confirmed 10th—12th graders (as of the 2023—2024 school year) will be eligible to attend!
